THE CHRIST CANDLE



Though all the candles of the Advent wreath have now been lit, there still remains one candle to light, the candle to which all other candles have been pointing and leading up to: the Paschal or Christ candle.

The word paschal is derived from the name of Passover. At the first Passover, a perfect, unblemished lamb was sacrificed and its blood spread on the doorposts of the homes of God's people so that, when the angel of death came, it would pass over the homes of God's chosen people – sparing them from death and allowing them to journey out of bondage in Egypt and into the Promised Land. Jesus is the true Passover Lamb, who came down to earth and gave his life so that, by his blood, we would be delivered from sin and death and be made fit for the Kingdom of God.

This candle is the largest of the candles because what it represents is the greatest, Christ himself. The white color of the candle sets it apart from the others, symbolizing the purity of Christ. This candle stays lit during the Christmas and Epiphany seasons to remind us that Jesus is the Light of the World. It is lit again during the Easter season to remind us that the darkness of his death on the cross could not overcome him.

We light this same candle at Baptisms and on All Saints Day to remind us that Jesus said we, too, are the light of the world. Jesus said the Church is "a city set upon a hill" (Matthew 5:14), and that we are called to "let our light so shine before others so that they may see out good works and give glory to our Father in heaven." (Matthew 5:6)

Finally, the candle is lit for funerals and on Christ the King Sunday, to remember the final victory of Light over darkness, the eternal life promised to all who have confessed faith in Christ in this life.



CHILDREN'S SERMON



The First Reading is from the 7th chapter of Isaiah

First Reading: Isaiah 7:10-14

¹⁰Again the LORD spoke to Ahaz: ¹¹"Ask a sign of the LORD your God; let it be deep as Sheol or high as heaven." ¹²But Ahaz said, "I will not ask, and I will not put the LORD to the test." ¹³And he said, "Hear then, O house of David! Is it too little for you to weary men, that you weary my God also? ¹⁴Therefore the LORD himself will give you a sign. Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel."

This is the Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

The Psalm is read responsively.

- ³ Your people will offer themselves freely on the day of your power, in holy garments; from the womb of the morning, the dew of your youth will be yours.
- ⁴The Lord has sworn and will not change his mind, "You are a priest forever after the order of Melchizedek."

Brief silence for reflection.

The Second Reading is from the 4th chapter of 1 John

Second Reading: 1 John 4:7-16

⁷Beloved, let us love one another, for love is from God, and whoever loves has been born of God and knows God. 8Anyone who does not love does not know God, because God is love. 9In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him. 10In this is love, not that we have loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins. 11Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. 12No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us and his love is perfected in us. 13By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. 14And we have seen and testify that the Father has sent his Son to be the Savior of the world. 15Whoever confesses that Jesus is the Son of God, God abides in him, and he in God. 16So we have come to know and to believe the love that God has for us. God is love, and whoever abides in love abides in God, and God abides in him.

This is the Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Gospel: Matthew 1:18-25

¹⁸The birth of Jesus Christ took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been betrothed to Joseph, before they came together she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. ¹⁹And her

husband Joseph, being a just man and unwilling to put her to shame, resolved to divorce her quietly. ²⁰But as he considered these things, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream, saying, "Joseph, son of David, do not fear to take Mary as your wife, for that which is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. ²¹She will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." ²²All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet: ²³"Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall call his name Immanuel" (which means, God with us). ²⁴When Joseph woke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him: he took his wife, ²⁵but knew her not until she had given birth to a son. And he called his name Jesus.

NICENE CREED

C: We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven; by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

INVITATION TO COMMUNION AND TO PRAY FOR EACH OTHER

We invite you to pray silently for someone in the congregation while sitting in the pew before or after receiving Communion or while in line waiting to receive. Two people will be at the back of the sanctuary praying for everyone at this time.

All are welcome to receive the Lord's Body and Blood who are baptized in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and believe that Jesus Christ is truly present in the bread and wine.

HOW WE COMMUNE: When you come forward the pastor will first give you bread to eat. Then, take a cup from the tray. The assistant will pour in wine to drink. Afterward, you will place the empty cup in the water in the plastic container at the side aisle, and return to your seat.

If you are unable to consume wine, you may commune with only the bread. Unbaptized and those who have yet to receive first communion may come forward to receive a blessing. Signify by holding your hands to your chest instead of reaching out for the bread and wine.

The assembly stands (if able) when everyone has received the sacrament.
